Madeira Bridge Quiz - Number 5

You arrive in 6♥ and West leads the jack of clubs to your ace. When you play the ace of trumps, West throws a club. How will you continue?

You need the king of spades to be with East and must endplay one of the defenders to give you an entry to dummy. You cash the ace of diamonds and exit with a low club. Suppose that East wins this trick. What can he do? If he exits with a trump, you will run this to dummy's eight. Similarly, a low spade switch will be run to the jack. A diamond exit will give dummy the lead and you will then be able to finesse in spades yourself. Nor will a third round of clubs, giving you a ruff-and-discard, help the defence's cause. You will ruff in the dummy, discarding a spade, and throw the queen of spades on the diamond king. The story is the same if West chooses to win the club exit. He cannot play a spade, a diamond or a club without giving you the contract.



In the Lap of the Bridge Gods


They say that your bridge luck will even out in the long run. The Bridge Gods give, and the Bridge Gods take away. Norwegian international, Jon Sveindal, saw evidence of this on the first day of the Teams championship. In the first round he had this adventure:



West's 3NT opening showed a solid minor suit and no high card outside. Sveindal raised partner's spade overcall to a grand slam, confident that any necessary finesses would be successful.

The spotlight swung to East now. What should he lead? They say you should look for a safe lead against a grand slam and East decided to lead his partner's suit. Did West hold solid diamonds or solid clubs? Since East held only two clubs and four diamonds, he decided that West's suit was more likely to be clubs. He led the *8 and West ruffed to defeat the contract!

In the third round Sveindal and his partner, Montserrat Mestres, may have thought that the Bridge Gods owed them one. This deal arose:



You think that 4* is an overbid? You could be right! North led the *A and Sveindal ruffed. After drawing trumps in two rounds, he led the *Q from dummy. (There was a small chance that South might make the mistake of ducking from *A-x, fearing a singleton *K with his partner.)

South won with the bare A. Since a diamond return would give a fatal ruff-and-discard, South had to switch to a heart. Sveindal tried his luck with the Q and (yes!) the card held the trick. Not before time, the Bridge Gods had delivered some justice.

As you see, 6. by East cannot be beaten. South cannot lead a heart effectively and the spade suit will provide one heart discard from the East hand.

2 **(**Alert!)

The Multi $2 \blacklozenge$ opening bid has been around for some time. At some time it's use was so widespread that when the rules committee decided on barring weak opening bids with no known suit they made this convention the exception. In the old days it started by being a nuisance for opponents, but nowadays that everybody has a defence prepared, it's used more as a way to free up the $2 \blacktriangledown$ and $2 \spadesuit$ opening bids.

It can still be a nuisance to partner, though. Try this bidding problem - you are sitting North and hold:

Partner opens the bidding with a Multi 2. , RHO passes and it's your bid.

Remember that 2♥ would show no interest in playing anything else if partner holds the heart suit. 2♠ would show no interest in playing anything else but 2♠ if that partner's suit. And 3 or 4♥ would ask partner to pass or correct. So..., what's your bid?

At the table the bidding went:

I don't see much wrong with the bidding, but it led to something like 5 down. Partner held:

Paulo Gonçalves Pereira, one of Portugal's Top players (who is used to play Multi) told me he might bid $2 \checkmark$ and follow with $3 \checkmark$, showing a forcing hand with 5 + hearts. "What if partner holds 6 hearts to the King and KQ of diamonds how will you explain playing a cold slam hand in $2 \checkmark ?$ " I said. "Well, when we have 11 hearts between us someone will re-open the bidding." He might be right, but still...

Sitting South at the other table he did better by not opening 2 \(\) (also multi in

their system). With a hand quite suitable for a heart contract South decided to pass in first seat leaving partner more room and getting to the better contract of $4 \checkmark$.

Now look at it from a declarer's point of view, playing 4♥. (rotated for convienience)




The lead was the AQ. What's the best line?

Declarer tried ruffing three diamonds in dummy and discarding a club on the A. When the A was ruffed and the fourth diamond over-ruffed declarer still had a losing club and the VK was the setting trick.

It seems a better line, once you avoided the club lead, to play a diamond to the Queen at trick two. Now you can discard dummy's clubs on $\bullet A$ and J and try to use the $\bullet A$ to discard the fourth diamond, limiting your losses to the trump suit. It would have worked on the actual lay-out.
